Evidence-based literacy instruction benefits all students. When general educators use explicit instruction in phonics, reading proficiency rates improve drastically. In one district, student proficiency increased from 47 percent to 84 percent after teachers learned about the science of reading and used explicit and systematic phonics instruction.

Evidence-Based Instruction and Teacher Induction

Evidence-based instruction includes materials and methods that have been tested and found to be effective for large groups of diverse students and across two or more experimental research

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studies. For the purpose of this blog, the terms empirically-based and research-based are understood to mean the same thing as scientifically-based.

What is Evidence-Based Instruction?

An evidence-based teaching strategy is any approach to teaching that is supported by research. However, research shows that some strategies have far more impact than others. Often, reviews of research and meta-analyses can shed light on these strategies. There is no doubt that teachers make a difference in how well their kids do at school.

Evidence-Based Teaching Strategy 10: Nurture Meta-Cognition
Many teachers believe they are encouraging students to use meta-cognition when they are just asking students to use strategies - strategies such as making connections when reading or self-verbalising when solving problems.
