Ong on the Differences between Orality and Literacy Walter Ong characterises the main differences between the languages of oral and literate cultures in these terms: [It] is possible to generalize somewhat about the psychodynamics of primary oral cultures, that is, of oral cultures untouched by writing. ...

Ong on the Differences between Orality and Literacy - New ...

Generally, “literacy” is understood as the ability to read and write, while “orality” describes the primary verbal medium employed by cultures with little or no exposure to writing. A “great divide” is sometimes posited between them, assigning to each certain cognitive, social, and cultural characteristics.

The term “orality” has been used in a variety of ways, often to describe, in a generalised fashion, the structures of consciousness found in cultures that do not employ, or employ minimally, the technologies of writing.
