For this reason, Aristotle of Stagira calls Thales the founder of natural philosophy, a branch of philosophy that also included men like Anaximander and Anaximenes.

Thales of Miletus - Livius

Thales is believed to have been the teacher of Anaximander; he is the first natural philosopher in the Ionian (Milesian) School. According to Anaximander of Miletus (mid-6th century), the word *apeiron* meant unbounded, infinite, indefinite, or undefined.
