The Aeneid (/ ˈniːɪd / ɪh-NEE-ɪd; Latin: Aeneis [aɛˈneːɪs]) is a Latin epic poem, written by Virgil between 29 and 19 BC, that tells the legendary story of Aeneas, a Trojan who travelled to Italy, where he became the ancestor of the Romans. It comprises 9,896 lines in dactylic hexameter.
