The earliest parts in Old Syriac are thought to have been translated from Hebrew or Aramaic texts by Jewish Christians at Edessa, although the Old Testament Peshitta was later revised according to Greek textual principles.

We find that the Aramaic Peshitta Old Testament has a similar history to the Aramaic Targums, in that both are translations of the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament). However, whereas the Aramaic Targums were adopted by Jews, the Aramaic Peshitta Old Testament was adopted by the early Jewish/Christian believers. We will see how important the Aramaic Peshitta Old Testament is for Bible believers today, to get back to a more solid Bible-based faith.

What is the Aramaic Peshitta Old Testament?

The Syriac Old Testament is a translation from the original Hebrew and Aramaic (a different Aramaic dialect from Syriac which is known by the name 'Biblical Aramaic'). The close similarities between the Palestinian dialect of Aramaic spoken by Christ and Syriac offer us a unique understanding of some of the Biblical readings.

Most of the apocryphal books of the Old Testament are found in the Syriac, and the Book of Sirach is held to have been translated from the Hebrew and not from the Septuagint. 4.

The first major translation from the original Hebrew and Aramaic of the Old Testament into Syriac was the Peshitto. It was accomplished by many different translators over a considerable period of time in the first two centuries of the Christian Era.

Syriac Translations of the Bible
