'THE MISFITS' is a popular mnemonic to assist in identifying the cause of critical illness in the neonatal period. T = Trauma (Accidental and Non Accidental) H = Heart Disease, Hypovolemia, Hypoxia E = Endocrine (Congenital Adrenal Hyperplasia, Thyrotoxicosis)

### **Neonatal Emergencies - resusme**

Congenital Adrenal Hyperplasia group of enzyme defects which impair steroid hormone production  
21-hydroxylase - 90% of cases two forms partial: simple virilizing more complete deficiency: salt losing  
Congenital Adrenal Hyperplasia females are virilized; males usually appear normal salt losing  
- adrenal insufficiency occurs under basal conditions significant impairment of cortisol and aldosterone synthesis most have onset of symptoms at 6-14 days shock with hypoglycemia, hyponatremia ...
