Topical pain relievers (such as lidocaine patches, IcyHot, Aspercreme or BenGay) may lessen pain by numbing the area, reducing inflammation or causing a form of skin irritation that "distracts" the brain from focusing on pain. Narcotic pain relievers, such as morphine and codeine, are the most powerful pain treatments.

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In order to make your pain management plan, your doctor will first find out whether you have sudden ("acute") or long-term ("chronic") pain. Acute pain starts suddenly and usually feels sharp.

Unidimensional tools are the most commonly used pain assessment tools and look at one area of pain, usually pain intensity. These tools include the visual analogue scales, verbal rating scales and verbal descriptor scales. These are generally used when performing a pain assessment on a patient
